MEMORABLE MOMENTS BETWEEN THE CLUBS

- In Round 1, 1951, at Princes Park, Keith Warburton (Carlton) scored 7.3 goals on debut. Carlton 13.9 (87) defeated Hawthorn 7.15 (57).
- In 1957 at the MCG before a crowd of 69,455, Hawthorn played its first ever final against Carlton. The first semi-final was played in very wet conditions with hailstones at half-time. Hawthorn 10.11 (71) defeated Carlton 6.12 [48].
- In Round 1, 1965, Carlton met Hawthorn at Glenferrie Oval. A record crowd of 36,000 attended the match. This was Ron Barassi's first match as Carlton's captain-coach. The final score read: Carlton 12.19 (91) to Hawthorn 8.6. (54).
- At Princes Park in Round 21, 1972, Carlton 24.12 (156) defeated Hawthorn 11.22 (88). The crowd of 32,048 saw Carlton forward, Greg Kennedy, kick 12.3 goals.
- In Round 18, 1989, at Waverley Park, Carlton 14.6 (90) were defeated by Hawthorn 14.11 (95). The crowd of 33,615 saw Jason Dunstall (Hawthorn) kick his 100th goal for the season.
- At the MCG in Round 6, 2009, the crowd was 69,814. In a close match Hawthorn 16.10 (106) defeated Carlton (15.12 (102). Blues' forward, Brendan Fevola, kicked 8.4 goals. Unfortunately, Favola hit the post from twenty metres out with less than a minute to play.

THE 1986 GRAND FINAL

An MCG attendance of 101,861 saw Hawthorn 16.14 (110) defeat Carlton 9.14 (68). The Hawks were captained by Michael Tuck and coached by Allan Jeans. The Blues were captained by Mark Maclure and coached by Robert Walls. Prominent goalkickers for Hawthorn were Jason Dunstall (6), Gary Buckenara (4) and Dermott Brereton (3). The best goal scorer for Carlton was Paul Meldrum with three goals. Hawthorn had endured two crushing grand final defeats to Essendon but were not to be denied in 1986. Hawthorn defender, Gary Ayres won the Norm Smith Medal for best on the ground. Ayres also won the Hawk's best and fairest. Carlton defender, Bruce Doull, retired after the match. On November 3, 1986, around 25,000 Japanese fans at Yokahama Stadium, watched Hawthorn 22.17 (149) defeat Carlton 13.18 (96).

OVER TO YOU

- 1. Who am I? I was captain of Hawthorn's 1971 premiership side. I coached Hawthorn to a flag in 1978. I was Carlton's premiership coach in 1981 and 1982.
- 2. Who am I? I played with Carlton from 1933 to 1941 in 123 games and kicked 78 goals. I was a Blues premiership player in 1938. I coached South Melbourne in 1948 to 1949 in 28 games and Hawthorn 1952 to 1959 in 146 games.
- 3. Name the finals match for which the Hawthorn banner that is pictured right was raised.
- 4. Who am I? I played with Hawthorn (1929-1933 in 61 games with 26 goals) and Carlton (1934-1943 in 162 games with 52 goals). I won Carlton's Best and Fairest award in 1935 and 1940. I was a member of the Blues' 1938 premiership team. I coached Carlton from 1956 to 1958 and St Kilda from 1959 to 1960.



This Round in History – Round 16 on the MCG

The highest score in Round 16 on the MCG is 27.18 (180) by Hawthorn against Richmond 17.11 (113) in 1985. The overall Round 16 record is 34.18 (222) by Richmond against St Kilda 11.4 (70) at the Sydney Cricket Ground in 1980. The most goals by an individual is 11 by Dermott Brereton for Hawthorn against Richmond in 1990. Hawthorn kicked 25.9 (159) to win by 91 points. The overall Round 16 goal-kicking record is 13 by Tony Modra for Adelaide against Richmond at Football Park (Adelaide) in 1993. Adelaide kicked 26.15 (171) to win by 139 points. The highest score in a quarter is 12.1 (73) in the first quarter by the Kangaroos against Essendon in 2001. Despite trailing by 58 points at the first change, Essendon went on to win by 12 points: 27.9 (171) to 25.9 (159). The overall Round 16 record for the highest score in a quarter is 13.3 (81) by Hawthorn against North Melbourne in the first quarter at Princes Park in 1982. Hawthorn went on to kick 32.14 (206) to win by 96 points. The highest Round 16 attendance at the MCG is 83,773 on Sunday July 19, 1998 when Essendon defeated Richmond by 19 points.





THE 1987 GRAND FINAL

Played before an MCG crowd of 92,754 on a day when the temperature soared into the 30s, Carlton was captained by Stephen Kernahan and coached by Robert Walls. Hawthorn were captained by Michael Tuck and coached by Allan Jeans. The best goalscorers for the Blues were Stephen Kernahan (3) and Craig Bradley (3). The Hawks' best goal kicker was John Kennedy with three goals. The Norm Smith Medal was won by David Rhys-Jones. The final score read: Carlton 15.14 (104) to Hawthorn 9.17 (71). The Hawks looked drained after the post-siren win in the preliminary final the previous week against Melbourne.
