SOME GREAT GOALKICKING FEATS BETWEEN THE TIGERS AND HAWKS

- In Round 5, 1985, at Princes Park, Michael Roach kicked 11.3 for the Tigers. Richmond 29.14 (188) defeated Hawthorn 21.23 (149) in front of 17,257 fans.
- At Punt Road Oval in Round 6, 1941, Jack Titus kicked 10 goals for Richmond. The Richmond side scored 17.15 (117) to Hawthorn's 8.14 (62). The crowd that day was 8,500.
- At Waverley Park in Round 7, 1992, Hawk full forward Jason Dunstall kicked 17.5 against the Tigers. Hawthorn 25.22 (172) defeated Richmond 14.9 (93) in front of a crowd of 26,789.
- In Round 22 at the MCG in 1992, Hawk Jason Dunstall kicked 12.6 against the Tigers. Hawthorn 25.20 (170) defeated Richmond 13.8 (86) in front of 20,423 fans. In the two matches against Richmond in 1992, Dunstall had booted 29.11.
- In Round 16, 1990, at the MCG, Hawk Dermott Brereton kicked 11.2 against the Tigers. Hawthorn 25.9 (159) defeated Richmond 10.8 (68) in front of a crowd of 25,532.
- In Round 7, 1971, at Glenferrie Oval, Peter Hudson kicked 10.4 for the Hawks. Hawthorn 21.19 (145) defeated Richmond 12.6 (78) before a crowd of 22,976 fans.

DID YOU KNOW? – FOOTBALL ON ROLLER SKATES

According to *Melbourne Punch*, football on roller skates seems to have been initiated at the Exhibition Skating Rink, Fitzroy, on August 25, 1888, as, "the newest novelty of the season... a football match on skates, Fitzroy against all-comers." On Wednesday May 8, 1889, a football match on roller skates was played as a part of a skating carnival at the Richmond Skating Rink, which survives today as the Barbeques Galore/Lombard Party & Events building on Bridge Road. Teams were recruited to represent the suburbs of Richmond and Fitzroy. The *Richmond Guardian* described it as "very amusing, and ended in a draw." *Melbourne Punch* of May 16 reported that it was held in the, "local well-appointed rink... and was favoured with a very large attendance. The rink was prettily decorated, and the limelight was used with good effect. The grand match took place at half-past nine, and was followed by exhibitions of fancy skating by Professor Caldwell. "A return game, that seems to have been seven players a side, was held on May 25, and was described in the *Fitzroy City Press* as the,

"...first match, football on skates, of the season took place at the Exhibition Skating Rink, Brunswick Street... when a large number of spectators gathered to see the fun. Richmond and Fitzroy were the contesting teams and a really good game ensued. There was only one goal kicked during the evening but the skill exhibited by the players made the game worth witnessing... [Fitzroy] kicked off and at first, play centred round the Richmond goal, Bennett however by a good kick sent the ball to Greenwood who put it through the posts, and secured the first and only goal of the evening for Fitzroy. There was great cheering at this but though some excellent play ensued no more goals were to be had... Spectators were greatly interested and amused, laughter and cheers being frequent."

This Round in History – Round 19 on the MCG

The highest score is 27.11 (173) by Melbourne against Sydney 15.16 (106) in 1990. The overall Round 19 highest score is 27.16 (178) by Hawthorn against Fitzroy 15.14 (104) in 1988. The most goals by an individual in Round 19 at the MCG is eight by five players: Collingwood's Brian Taylor against Brisbane in 1988, Sydney's Simon Minton-Connell against Essendon in 1993, Melbourne's Garry Lyon against Essendon in 1994, Collingwood's Saverio Rocca against Essendon in 1995 and Melbourne's David Neitz against Carlton in 1996. The overall Round 19 goalkicking record is also the overall VFL/AFL record – 18 by Fred Fanning of Melbourne against St Kilda at the Junction Oval in 1947. Melbourne kicked 27.9 (171) to win by 93 points. The highest score in a quarter is 11.1 (67) by Carlton in the third quarter against Richmond in 1985. Carlton finished with 23.15 (153) to win by 73 points. The overall Round 19 highest score in a quarter is 13.4 (82) by Essendon in the second quarter against North Melbourne at Windy Hill in 1972. Essendon kicked 21.14 (140) to win by 45 points. The highest Round 19 attendance at the MCG was recorded at a night game on Friday July 24, 1992, when 88,066 saw Collingwood defeat Essendon by 22 points.

FINALS

Richmond and Hawthorn have only played the one final against each other. Hawthorn qualified for its first finals series in 1957. Richmond first made the finals in 1916, but from 1948 to 1966 the Tigers did not reach the finals at all. In 1971, 1974, 1975, 1977, 1982, 2001, 2013, 2014 and 2015 Richmond and Hawthorn both qualified for the finals series but did not play each other – nine seasons. The only time that the Tigers and the Hawks have met in a final was the first qualifying final of 2018. Played at the MCG before a crowd of 91,446, Richmond won by 31 points, 13.17 (95) to the Hawks 9.10 (64).

LUCKY 13 – FOR SOME

Hawthorn have won the League premiership 13 times, in 1961, 1971, 1976, 1978, 1983, 1986, 1988, 1989, 1991, 2008, 2013, 2014 and 2015. Richmond have also won the League premiership 13 times, in 1920, 1921, 1932, 1934, 1943, 1967, 1969, 1973, 1974, 1980, 2017, 2019 and 2020.
