WALLABIES

In 1908 the Australian Rugby Union team arrived in Plymouth. Newspaper columnists at the time, looking for a nickname, decided on the "Rabbits". Herbert Moran, who captained Australia, told the *London News*, "...we dropped considerable cold water on 'Rabbits'. Modest though we be we could not labour under an appellation borrowed from an English imported pest... Wallabies, Kangaroos, Kookaburras and Wallaroos were suggested... All were agreed that any name would be preferable to 'Rabbits'. 'Wallabies' won by a couple of votes,..."

BLEDISLOE CUP

Tonight is the fourth Tri Nations/Rugby Championship match to be hosted at the MCG. The Bledisloe Cup, a long-standing competition between Australian and New Zealand representative Rugby Union sides, has been embedded in the Tri Nations/Rugby Championship series since 1996.

The Sydney Cricket Ground was the site of the first clash between Australia and New Zealand in 1903. There have been 167 matches played between the two countries with the All Blacks winning 117, Australia 42, with eight matches drawn. However, in the years between 1920 and 1928, the New Zealand Rugby Union fielded a New Zealand XV against "Australian" teams that were essentially New South Wales state sides, as Rugby Unions had dissolved in other states (particularly Queensland) after the Great War. Therefore, while the Australian Rugby Union awarded "Test" caps for those matches, the New Zealand Rugby Union does not regard them as Test matches.




The Wallaby image that appeared on the 1908 Souvenir Programme of the Australian Tour.

It was Lord Bledisloe who presented a cup in 1931 for matches between the Australian and New Zealand Rugby Unions. Educated at Eton and Oxford and a solicitor by profession, it would appear Bledisloe was a powerhouse in English society, clearly favoured by King George V. His World War I years were spent with the Royal Engineer Special Reserves. In 1926 Bledisloe was appointed to the Privy Council. Lydney Park, and the titles associated with the estate, were inherited by him on the death of his brother. In 1930 he was appointed the fourth Governor-General of New Zealand. He wasted no time immersing himself in local society and culture. As well as establishing the Bledisloe Cup, he set up the New Zealand Chess Federation trophy. He was also elected Grand Master of the Masonic Lodge in New Zealand. Perhaps the most poignant of his achievements was his purchase of the site where the Treaty of Waitanga was signed. He gifted it to the nation as a memorial in 1934.

MATT BURKE

One of the Wallabies' greats is undoubtedly Matt Burke. He was born in 1973, educated at St Joseph's Hunters Hill and was a member of the Australian School Boys' team which toured the United States and Ireland in 1990. Opportunities opened when he was elevated to the Australian U 21s in 1992, the same year he was involved with the Hong Kong 7s. The following year he played in the Rugby World Cup 7s and made his debut against the Springboks in the third test. One of the most impressive tries in Bledisloe history belongs to Burke... the second Test at Lang Park. Equally impressive, he scored all 24 points (2 tries, 1 conversion and 4 penalties) at the MCG in 1998 against the All Blacks. While he is considered to be one of the best Test goal-kickers of his day, he was known to have bad days too, notably the third match of the Bledisloe when he missed three easy attempts in the first half and was replaced by captain, John Eales. At the time of retirement Matt Burke held 22 Australian and 7 International records. In 1996 he had 189 test points, (6 tries, 27 conversions, 35 penalties) the most for that year. He was the 4th highest international point scorer, the 20th most capped international of all time, and Wallaby of the Year in 1996. The Matt Burke Trophy is presented to the Waratahs' Player of the Year.



AUSTRALIA v NEW ZEALAND AT THE MCG

A world record Rugby Union crowd of 90,119 flocked to the MCG to see the reigning Tri Nations Champion and Bledisloe Cup holder, New Zealand, meet the Wallabies.

Contested as a part of the 1997 Tri-Nations Series with South Africa, New Zealand claimed both the Bledisloe Cup and the Tri Nations undefeated. Australia finished third in the Tri Nations.

Empowered by the success of the 1997 event, the *MCC News* reported negotiations were almost complete for staging another Test. It was hoped the Wallabies would step up to the plate and offer more resistance, and they did, before 75,147 spectators.



Australia won the second match for the Bledisloe Cup to claim the trophy. South Africa won the 1998 Tri Nations. New Zealand finished third in the Tri Nations.





After a nine year hiatus, the MCG once more hosted the Bledisloe, the anticipation high with a full page colour cover action photograph on the MCC News. The match was the first of the series. The Wallabies thrilled the 78,959 strong crowd with a 20-15 win which followed three years of domination by the All Blacks, at the time ranked the top team in the world

New Zealand won the second Bledisloe Cup match at Eden Park to retain the trophy. It also defeated South Africa twice to win the 2007 Tri Nations. Australia finished second in the Tri Nations.

Rugby Union at the MCG

- There have been 20 rugby football matches (including curtain raisers) at the MCG.
- The first rugby football match played on the MCG was between Waratah, a leading Sydney rugby club, and Carlton, the famous Australian football club, on June 29, 1878.
- The highest score in a rugby match at the MCG is 56. This has been achieved twice. On June 30, 1951, a New Zealand XV scored 13 tries to defeat an Australian XV, 56 to 11. In the curtain raiser to the July 11, 1998, Bledisloe Cup match at the MCG, the Australian Barbarians team defeated Victoria 56 to 22.
- The greatest winning margin for a rugby match at the MCG is 51 points, when a South African XV scored 13 tries on June 18, 1921, to defeat Victoria 51 points to nil.
- The most points scored by a rugby player in a game at the MCG is 28. Ron Jarden of a New Zealand XV scored 28 points, consisting of five tries, five conversions and one penalty, on June 30, 1951, against Victoria.
- There have been three international rugby Test matches at the MCG. All have been Bledisloe Cup games between Australia and New Zealand. Australia has won twice and New Zealand once.
- The largest attendance for a Rugby Union match at the MCG is 90,119 for the Australia v New Zealand Bledisloe Cup/Tri Nations Test match in 1997.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Australia's first touring team, soon to be dubbed the Wallabies, played their first ever match against Victoria on the MCG in 1908.
- The Bledisloe Cup was "lost" for some years. It was discovered in the early 1950s, covered in dust and cardboard boxes at a New Zealand government tourist bureau in Melbourne. It was not prized as much then as now. http://nla.gov.au/nla.news-article10971887
- Edward "Weary" Dunlop, a Victorian, played two Tests against New Zealand. His first cap was in Sydney on July 23, 1932. He is pictured in his debut Test (right), running behind Syd Malcolm, Australia's captain. Captured by the Japanese following the fall of Singapore in 1942, Dunlop, a doctor, saved the lives of many Allied POWs forced to work on the notorious Thai-Burma Railway. Dunlop was a full member of the MCC from the 1955/56 membership season.
- Matthew Burke scored all of Australia's 24 points in their Test at the MCG on July 11, 1998. It was a then world record for an individual player against the All Blacks, and also included Burke's 300th Test point.
