# AUSTRALIA V SRI LANKA IN TWENTY20 INTERNATIONALS



The first Twenty20 International (T20I) was played between New Zealand and Australia at Eden Park in Auckland on February 17, 2005 with Australia winning by 44 runs. Australia and Sri Lanka played their first T20I in Cape Town at the group stage of the first ICC World T20 in South Africa on September 20, 2007, Australia winning by 10 wickets. Australia won two of the first three matches played between the two countries but the Sri Lankans then took to the new version of the game with quite some aplomb and won five matches against the Australians in little more than two years including three in Australia. In recent years, however, Australia has won ten out of the twelve matches played between the two countries, the majority of which have been played in Australia. Four matches have been played as part of T20 international tournaments with Australia winning three. Australia has won one of the three matches played at the MCG before this series.

This match is the fourth in the current series. The fifth is also at the MCG in Sunday, 20 February, 2022. Prior to this series the two countries met in the United Arab Emirates in October 2021 during the ICC T20 World Cup 2021/22; Australia winning by seven wickets. Australia went on to win the tournament while Sri Lanka failed to qualify for the finals.

### Australia v Sri Lanka in T20ls at the MCG

Today is the fourth time that the two countries have met at the MCG in the T20I format. In their first encounter on January 28, 2013, Sri Lanka won by 2 runs under the Duckworth/Lewis Method (due to a rain delay). Their most recent match at the MCG before the current series was on November 1, 2019. It was the last of a three-match T20I series; the other fixtures being in Adelaide and Brisbane. The Australians won the series 3-0. In other series that season in Australia the home team played Pakistan in two Tests (Australia 2-0) and three T20Is (Australia 2, one a No Result) and New Zealand in three Tests (Australia 3-0) and three ODIs (Australia 1-0 with two cancelled in the early stages of the Pandemic).

SRI LANKA 8/142 (20 overs) (MDKJ Perera 57; PJ Cummins 2/23, KW Richardson 2/25, MA Starc 2/32) lost to AUSTRALIA 3/145 (17.4 overs) (DA Warner 57\*, AJ Finch 37) by seven wickets. *Player of the match*: David Warner

Australia won the toss and sent the Sri Lankans (who had recently been defeated 1-2 by the New Zealanders at home) into bat. Opening bowlers Mitchell Starc and Kane Richardson had the visitors 2/33 in the fifth over with Mendis and Dickwella both out. Perera (57 off 45 balls with four fours and one six) then added 43 with Fernando (20) to repair the situation. Perera would go on to top score for his team and wrest back some of the initiative in a series of small but handy partnerships. Cummins (2/23) was the most impressive of the Australian bowlers. Australia began its reply with a 69-run partnership between Warner (57, 50, 4, 1) and Finch (37, 25, 1, 3). Smith and McDermott were then dismissed cheaply but Warner was joined by Turner and they shared a 46-run partnership, the desired total being comfortably chased down within the eighteenth over.

### A Glimpse at "The Wild Thing"

He bowled with frightening pace and fire, was a nightmare happening to those facing him and at his best, was close to the elite of pacemen.

Shaun William Tate was born at Bedford Park, Adelaide on 22 February, 1983. In his teenage years he played for Sturt in the Adelaide A Grade competition, topping the bowling averages in 2001/02 (31 wickets at 14.29 with a best performance of 5/58. He also represented South Australia in Under-17s and Under-19s Championships.

Tait made his first-class debut in the Pura Cup for South Australia in the 2002/03 season at the Adelaide Oval against Western Australia, bowling in one innings only and taking 3/77 in 22.2 overs. He debuted impressively; taking 20 wickets for the season at 22.55 with a best return of 5/68. He also began his domestic 50-over career and his strong performances earned him a place at the Australian Cricket Academy. Tate was then entering one of the most successful phases of his career; being named Bradman Young cricketer of the year in 2003/04 and awarded the ING Cup's Best New Talent Prize. His 8/43 against Tasmania was at that time the best return in the tournament's history.

In 2004/05 he had a stellar Pura Cup season, taking 65 wickets at 20.16 leading to his selection for the 2005 Ashes tour of England. He made his Test debut at Nottingham and also played in the final Test at the Oval. His next and last Test would be against India in Perth in January, 2008. Tait had had little impact on Test cricket (three matches for five wickets at 60.4).

He played intermittently during the 2005/06 – 2007/08 seasons. This resulted mainly from elbow and shoulder injuries believed to be connected to his vigorous slinging action and the extreme pace at which he bowled a lethal mix of yorkers, bumpers and reverse swing. These injuries were to trouble him for the remainder of his playing life. He was also at times suffering from physical and emotional exhaustion. During this period Tate debuted in the ODI format; his first match being against England in Sydney in 2007. In a career spanning four seasons he would go on to play 35 matches, taking 62 wickets at 23.56 with a best return of 4/39. In 2010 he unleashed a 161.1 kph thunderbolt at Lord's in an ODI; the second fastest in history – Shoaib Akhtar being the fastest on 161.3.

In 2009 Tate retired from first-class cricket to concentrate on the 20-over format. In 50 first-class matches he had taken 198 wickets at 28.59 with seven five-wicket hauls and one of 10 wickets, his best bowling in an innings being 7/29. In his final years Tate continued playing T20 cricket both internationally and locally for his country and for franchises at home and on the Indian sub-continent and in England. In all T20 cricket (below T20 Internationals) he played 314 matches and took 394 wickets. He had commenced his T20 International career in 2007 against New Zealand in Perth in 2007 and went on to play 21 matches, taking 28 wickets at 21.03 with a best return of 3/13. He retired from all cricket in 2017

Shaun Tate, as a boy, wanted to bowl fast and did. Sadly, the demand put on his body, particularly his elbow and shoulder, by his vigorous bowling action took its toll and may have limited his playing career, particularly in first-class cricket.
