AFL 2024 2ND ELIMINATION FINAL WESTERN BULLDOGS V HAWTHORN

BULLDOGS VERSUS HAWKS IN FINALS

The Bulldogs and the Hawks have played in finals five times, Hawthorn winning four of these and the Bulldogs one. The first time they met in a final was the 1961 grand final and their most recent final was the second semi final in 2016. Descriptions of both are below. Their other three finals were:

- 1985 qualifying final at the MCG Hawthorn 22.23 (155) defeated Footscray 8.14 (62), attendance 58,367.
- 1985 preliminary final at Waverley Park Hawthorn 16.13 (109) defeated Footscray 15.9 (99), attendance 55,246.
- 2008 second qualifying final at the MCG Hawthorn 18.19 (127) defeated Western Bulldogs 11.10 (76), attendance 76,703.

1961 GRAND FINAL

Hawthorn finished on top of the ladder in 1961 with 14 wins and four losses, while Footscray finished fourth with 11 wins and seven losses. Hawthorn defeated Melbourne in the second semi final by seven points to reach their first VFL grand final. Footscray defeated St Kilda by nine points in the first semi final and then Melbourne by 27 points in the preliminary final to qualify for their second grand final. The game was played on September 23 at the MCG, in front of a crowd of 107,935.

The Hawks won by 43 points, the final scores being 13.16 (94) to Footscray 7.9 (51). Footscray led at half time by eight points but Hawthorn, coached by John Kennedy Snr, stormed home with a ten goal to two second half. Hawthorn's strong second half was attributed to their superior fitness; the team being given the nickname "Kennedy's Commandos". Brendan Edwards (Hawthorn), who finished equal fifth in the 1961 Brownlow Medal, was adjudged best on the ground. Led by Graham Arthur, other good players for the Hawks included Colin Youren, John Winneke, Ian Law, Morton Browne and John McArthur. The best for the Bulldogs included captain/coach Ted Whitten, Ian Bryant, John Hoiles, John Schultz and Charlie Evans. The leading goalkicker for Hawthorn was Morton Browne with three and Ted Whitten also booted three for the Bulldogs.

2016 SECOND SEMI FINAL

The Western Bulldogs finished the 2016 AFL season seventh on the ladder with 15 wins and seven losses. Hawthorn finished third with 17 wins and five losses. In the first week of the finals, the Bulldogs defeated the West Coast Eagles by 47 points in the second elimination final in Perth, while Hawthorn went down to Geelong in the second qualifying final at the MCG by two points.

Hawthorn and the Bulldogs met in a semi final the following week at the MCG before a crowd of 87,823. The Hawks kicked the first three goals of the game and held an 11-point lead at quarter time (3.4 to 1.5). A goal to Liam Shiels midway through the second quarter put Hawthorn up by 23 points, but the Bulldogs fought back in the latter part of the quarter to trail by only one point at half time (7.5 to 6.10). After Luke Breust goaled early in the third term to give Hawthorn an eight-point lead, the Bulldogs got right on top, kicking six unanswered goals during the remainder of the quarter. They went into the final break with a lead of 26 points (12.11 to 8.9). Three goals early in the final quarter put the Bulldogs 43 points up and, despite Hawthorn scoring the next four goals, the Bulldogs ran out comfortable winners by 23 points, Caleb Daniel kicking their final goal just before the final siren. The final scores were **Western Bulldogs 16.11 (107) to Hawthorn 12.12 (84)**. The major goalkickers for the Bulldogs were Jake Stringer and Liam Picken with three each and Clay Smith and Marcus Bontempelli with two each. The only multiple goalkickers for Hawthorn were Liam Shiels and Luke Hodge with two each.

The Bulldogs followed their win over the Hawks with a six-point win over the GWS Giants in a preliminary final at the Sydney Showground. They completed a remarkable finals campaign with a 22-point victory over the Sydney Swans in the grand final to secure their second AFL/VFL premiership.



ELIMINATION FINALS EXPLAINED

The elimination final was first played in 1972 following the introduction of the McIntyre final five system. Elimination finals were played from 1972 to 1993 inclusive and were re-introduced in 2000. Between 1972 and 1990 the elimination final was played between the teams which finished fourth and fifth on the ladder. The loser was eliminated, and the winner proceeded to the first semi final.

In 1991, when the admission of Adelaide created a 15-team competition, the McIntyre final six system was introduced. Under this system two elimination finals were played with the fifth-placed side playing sixth and the third-placed playing fourth. The losing teams were eliminated. This arrangement was amended for the next two seasons, when fourth played fifth and third played sixth. Elimination finals were not played from 1994 to 1999.

With the introduction of the McIntyre final eight system in 1994, four qualifying finals were played in the first week when first played eighth, second played seventh, third played sixth and fourth played fifth. Under this system, the two lowest-placed losing teams were eliminated. The elimination final was reintroduced in 2000 as part of the revised final eight system. Under the current scheme, the fifth-placed team plays eighth and sixth-placed plays seventh. The losers are eliminated, and winners play the losers of the qualifying finals in the semi finals.

ELIMINATION FINALS AT THE MCG (1980-2023)

The first eight elimination finals from 1972 to 1979 were held at VFL Park, Waverley. In 1980 Richmond was to play in the qualifying final, but as a MCG tenant the Tigers were forced, under then League rules, to play this match at the neutral VFL Park. As both qualifying and elimination finals were to be played at the same time, the 1980 elimination final was scheduled for the MCG. The highest score in an elimination final at the MCG is 158 points recorded by Melbourne 22.26 (158) against North Melbourne 5.10 (40) in 1987. The highest score overall was 26.10 (166) by Adelaide against Essendon in the first elimination final at Football Park in 2009. The lowest score at the MCG is 5.10 (40) by North Melbourne in 1987 and Melbourne's winning margin of 118 points that year is the largest recorded for an elimination final. The lowest score overall is Sydney's 4.6 (30) against Greater Western Sydney at the SCG in 2018. The highest score in a quarter at the MCG is 10.7 (67) by Collingwood in the last quarter against Fitzroy in 1984. Collingwood kicked 23.15 (153) to defeat Fitzroy by 46 points after leading by only four points at three-quarter time. This is also the overall elimination final record. The most goals in an elimination final at the MCG is six, shared by Jason Dunstall for Hawthorn against Adelaide in 1993 and Mark Williams for Collingwood against Fitzroy in 1984. The overall record is nine by Tony Lockett for St Kilda against Geelong at Waverley Park in 1991, but St Kilda lost by seven points. The highest elimination final attendance was recorded on Sunday September 8, 2013, when 94,690 saw Carlton defeat Richmond by 20 points at the MCG.

VALE ALAN JOHN "JOHN" SCHULTZ, 1938-2024

The football world was saddened to learn of the death of Footscray/Western Bulldogs' legend John Schultz on Sunday September 1. A ruckman, Schultz came to Footscray from country club Boort having previously played briefly with Caulfield Grammarians. Playing with the Bulldogs from 1958 to 1968 in 188 games (37 goals), he was the club's best and fairest in 1960, 1962, 1964, 1965 and 1966, and was awarded the Brownlow Medal, the League's most prestigious annual individual honour. in 1960. He represented Victoria on 24 occasions and was selected in the All-Australian side in 1961. He was amongst the team's best players in their losing 1961 grand final side. Schultz was an inaugural inductee into the AFL Hall of Fame in 1996, and he was selected in the Bulldogs' Team of the Century in 2002. In 2010 Schultz was an inaugural inductee into the Footscray-Western Bulldogs Hall of Fame and he was raised to Legend status in 2012. Schultz became a mentor to Western Bulldogs' players later and he was chosen by the club to present the 2016 premiership cup to their captain Easton Wood after the grand final. The citation for Schultz when he was inducted into the AFL Hall of Fame read: "Rucking giant who never let the side down. Set the standard for the modern ruckman."

DID YOU KNOW?

Hawthorn and the Bulldogs have not met at the MCG since Round 2, 2019. A crowd of 39,368 saw the Western Bulldogs win by 19 points, 16.10 (106) to Hawthorn 13.9 (87). The teams were level a tick over 22 minutes into the final term, but three unanswered goals to the Bullies in time-on made the scoreline look more comfortable than the play throughout much of the afternoon would otherwise suggest. Josh Schache was the Dogs' best goalkicker with four goals while Jack Gunston also booted four for the Hawks. The Bulldogs' Jack Macrae was awarded three Brownlow Medal votes, Hawthorn's Jaeger O'Meara received two, and Schache got one.
