# Today's Match-Between the teams

Today's match is the twentieth between the teams since the commencement of the WBBL in the 2015/16 season. Before this season, the teams have met 18 times in the home and away seasons resulting in eight wins to the Stars and eight to the Renegades; one match yielded a No Result and one was abandoned. The teams have yet to meet in a final. Summary scores are set out below:

A review of the above tables suggests that the Sydney Sixers have been the best-performed team in the WBBL to date, winning the title twice and being runners-up three times. Three other teams have won two titles (Adelaide Strikers, Brisbane Heat and Sydney Thunder), while the Perth Scorchers have won one. The Melbourne Stars have been runners-up once; neither the Hobert Hurricanes nor the Melbourne Renegades have made it through to the deciding match to date.

The Sydney Sixers have topped the ladder after the home and away series on four occasions. The Adelaide Strikers, Brisbane Heat, Melbourne Stars and Sydney Thunder have each topped the ladder once, while the Hobart Hurricanes and Melbourne Renegades have yet todo so (finishing second being their best result). The Brisbane Heat and the Perth Scorchers have yet to finish below sixth position after the home and away series. The other six teams have finished on the bottom of the ladder at least once.

The Heat have the best record in total matches won in WBBL01-09 closely followed by the Sixers. The Sixers have the lowest number of defeats.

In the 2020/21 season the Sydney Thunder won the pennant. They had finished sixth the previous season (2019/20). This represents the best "turnaround" in performance in the tournament to date.

## Australian Womens' Domestic Twenty20 (T20) A Brief History

Victoria Spirit (4/135) defeated the New South Wales Breakers (6/118) by 17 runs in an unofficial women's domestic T20 match that was organised by Cricket Victoria and held at the Punt Road Oval on December 20, 2006. Victoria batted first with *Player-of-the-Match* Catherine Fitzpatrick top scoring with 42 runs off 30 balls  $(1 \sin 4, 4 \cos 5)$  to push the home team to a defendable score. She was supported by Sarah Edwards 37 (32 balls, 1 four) and Rachael Haynes 25 (31 balls, 3 fours). In reply for NSW Lisa Sthalekar top scored with 36 (26 balls, 6 fours) supported by Kate Blackwell's 30 (22 balls, 4 fours). Vic Spirit's Clea Smith was the only multiple wicket-taker in the match with figures of 2/19 off four overs. Although she went wicketless, Vic Spirit's Catherine Fitzpatrick was the most economical bowler in the match; conceding only 14 runs from her four overs. The Victorians' tight bowling was a significant factor in the result.

In the 2007/08 season a series of five matches were played as part of a women's interstate T20 tournament played in November 2007. Each state played two matches, but no final was programmed. The state teams participating were New South Wales, South Australia, Victoria, Queensland and Western Australia.

In the 2008/09 season the women's domestic T20 competition was expanded with two tournaments being staged. The Women's Interstate T20 tournament consisted of a series of five matches played by the same states that had played the previous season. Each state played two matches but there was no final. The second tournament was the Cricket Australia Women's Cup. This was the first extended Australian women's T20 tournament and was contested by Queensland  $2^{nd}$  XI, New South Wales  $2^{nd}$  XI, Victoria  $2^{nd}$  XI, South Australia  $2^{nd}$  XI, Western Australia  $2^{nd}$  XI and Tasmania and Australian Capital Territory (ACT) ( $1^{st}$  XIs). The tournament comprised 21 matches with the seven teams playing each other once. New South Wales won the cup and Victoria was runner-up.

In 2009/10 one T20 tournament was played - the inaugural Australian Women's T20 Cup. It commenced with seven first-eleven teams from the six states and the ACT competing in 21 matches with all teams playing each other once. At the end of the round-robin series New South Wales and Victoria had each won five matches but the former had a superior run rate. In the final, however, Victoria defeated New South Wales to win the Cup. From 2010/11 onwards the same teams contested the tournament, but there were further refinements. In 2010/11 the competition was extended to 42 matches, each team playing its six competitors twice. Semi-finals were added to the programme in 2013/14 but were deleted for the following season. At the end of the 2014/15 season Victoria had won three times (2009/10-2011/12), New South Wales twice (2012/13 and 2014/15) and Queensland once (2013/14).

In July 2015 Cricket Australia announced the establishment of the Australian Women's Big Bash League, known as the WBBL, beginning in season 2015/16. The tournament is contested by eight clubs across six states (two teams each in Victoria and New South Wales and one in the other states). Until the current season, the fixture comprised 56 qualifying matches played at major centres around Australia with all teams playing each other twice. In 2024/25 the number of qualifying matches has been reduced to 40 (in line with the Men's BBL schedule) with each team playing four teams once and three twice. To ensure that there is no reduction in the domestic season for women in 2024/25, Cricket Australia introduced a nine-team T20 tournament, known as the T20 Spring Challenge, this year as a lead up to the WBBL season. The Spring Challenge was played from October 11 to 20 in Sydney and Adelaide, and featured teams aligned with the eight Big Bash clubs plus the ACT Meteors.

 $Up \ until \ the \ 2021/22 \ season, the \ qualifying \ matches \ were followed \ by \ semi-finals \ and \ a \ final. \ Since \ then, the \ finals \ arrangements \ have been \ as follows:$ 

- Knockout: Teams finishing three and four after the home and away matches loser eliminated
- Challenger: Team finishing second after the home and away matches and winner of the Eliminator loser eliminated
- The Final: Team finishing first after the home and away matches and winner of the Challenger.

Born in 2001, Sutherland, an all-rounder, made her WBBL debut as a 15-year-old for the Melbourne Renegades in 2016/17. She moved to the Melbourne Stars the following season and has played WBBL cricket with the Stars ever since. She played for the Welsh Fire in The Hundred competition in England in 2022 and the Northern Superchargers in 2024. She was signed by the Gujarat Giants for the inaugural season of the Women's Premier League in India in 2023 and subsequently moved to the Delhi Capitals in 2024. After playing for Australia in the under 15 and under 19 teams, Sutherland made her international debut for Australia in 2020, making her T20 international debut against England in February and her One Day International (ODI) debut against New Zealand in October. She made her Test debut against India in September 2021. She made her maiden Test century (137 not out) in the one-off Test against England in June 2023 and her maiden ODI century (109 not out) against Ireland in July 2023. In February 2024, Sutherland became the ninth women's player to score a Test double century, scoring 210 and taking 5/30 against South Africa. She was a member of the Australian teams that won the Women's T20 World Cup in 2020 in Australia and 2023 in South Africa. She was also a member of Australia's winning team in Women's One Day International World Cup in New Zealand in 2022 and the Australian T20 team that won the Gold Medal at the Birmingham Commonwealth Games in 2022. Her brother Will is an all-rounder, who has played for Victoria and Australia, and her father James is the former CEO of Cricket Australia.
